Homemade Dog Toys

Toys are one of the most important items to provide for your dog. Toys help prevent boredom, provide mental stimulation, and encourage your dog to be physically active.

Did you know that a dog exhibiting poor behaviour is often bored and under-exercised?

Unfortunately dog toys can be very expensive, and if you've got a good chewer, they don't last very long. So here are my top three tips for quick and easy homemade dog toys.

Why use your old towels, t-shirts and jeans as cleaning rags when you can simply knot or plait them to make a great tug-of-war toy?

Learnt the hard way

It is unwise to give your dog an old shoe to play with. Your dog probably can't tell the difference between an old shoe and an expensive new one.
